Pragmatism and Expressivism

Synopsis

This course will discuss two strands in modern philosophy. One is the pragmatist strand, notably associated with the classic American pragmatists from C. S. Peirce to Richard Rorty and also visible in the writings of Frank Ramsey, Ludwig Wittgenstein, and Huw Price in Cambridge. The other is the expressivist approach to parts of language, notably represented by the 'emotivists' of the logical positivist movement, but descending to the present in the writings of Allan Gibbard and myself.

We shall discuss how each movement relates to its neighbours: pragmatism has a footing in straightforward empiricism; expressivism is an outcome of the Scottish sentimentalist tradition in moral philosophy, but also has an ancestry in Kant.
